## STRANGE PEOPLE

Has anyone considered your biblical perspective to be weird? The other day I had a conversation with an Agnostic, a lapsed Lutheran and a Roman Catholic who is heavily intro the ritual of religion. All three felt my conservative, Biblebased faith is extreme. I felt like a true outsider for holding such firm but unaccepted convictions.

This should not be surprising, but rather expected. Already in the first century A.D. Christians were pariahs of society. Peter addressed believers as, "aliens and strangers in the world (see I Peter 2:9-12)." *The more worldly people are, the more they will think we are strange!* We actually go to war with sinful desires and temptations that they don't see as being bad. We confess our sins, when they think they are, "good people". We don't take vengeance upon our enemies, but we really do pray for them. This strikes them as our being really weird!

However, there is no denying a godly life, which is usually seen most clearly when believers are under pressure or difficult circumstances. Peter said, "Live such good lives among the Pagans that, though they accuse you of doing wrong, they may see your good deeds and glorify God on the day he visits us (I Peter 2:12)."

Ultimately, it is this quality of being different, strange, and even alien to our culture which is appealing to some. They see we really believe it and live it, and that gives the Holy Spirit an opportunity to work on them!
