Especially in this Internet generation where we are bombarded with all manner of fake, conflated, perpetrated, and fabricated news, advertisements and come-ons, suspicion runs high. Add to that the new cult of worship of "Science", and you have the makings of a public high on skepticism. Faith need not apply.

#### PROPSERITY GOSPEL FALLING ON HARD TIMES?

I recently finished the book Everything Happens for a Reason, and Other Lies That I Have Loved by Kate Bowler. It's poignant and candid, but not very therapeutic for someone seeking strengthening in their faith while facing death. Kate hits all the emotional aspects of dying – she has an incurable cancer and faces it with openness and hope. But, this professor of divinity at Duke barely scratches the surface of the Scripture when it comes to making her good confession. I wish I could say that this dying woman's final breaths would breathe new life into the spiritually listless, but it will mostly help people avoid a few social faux pas.

The book is good, however, in that she reveals the hollow promise of the "Prosperity Gospel," a bankrupt form of Christianity for people with either enormous egos, desperate hopes to get more, or both. The examples of carcinogenic church behavior skewed toward wealth and happiness is a good warning to stay away from such preachers and congregations, as they cannot deliver on the promises they hold forth. The typical Christian life is not from glory to glory, but a combination of gory and glorious moments in anticipation of the Greater Glory to come.

### **WHAT GREAT MOVIES!**

The movie "I Can Only Imagine," is fantastic! It is a beautiful true life account of Brent Dillard, lead singer of the group Mercy Me. He was physically abused as a child by his father. I won't spoil the movie, but it is about redemption – and you need to see it! Trust me, it's well worth your time and money! If you missed it at the theater, check for it on Netflix in due time.

Other movies I have not yet seen, but look promising, are "Paul, Apostle of Christ," and "God's Not Dead III". This seems to be a great season for film watching for believers! Finally, we are seeing very high quality films. For decades Christian film makers had shoestring budgets and hopes that their films would be supported. Finally, a winning strategy has been found, wherein the films run only several days as opposed to booking theaters for longer runs. That way the film makers can make good on their expenses and efforts, and the movie can be extended without fear of fiscal calamity. How wonderful! We owe it to them to see their work, and we owe it to God to have fresh faith, one informed by good film making and cultural relevance.
