- +Work out daily. Six days a week I am at the gym or doing some physical activity. Is it an addiction? Probably, but a healthy one. My self-worth suffers if I do not make an effort to be in shape. I am grandfathered in at \$10/month. Cheapest health insurance on the planet!
- +Listen to good/godly music. I screen all lyrics and make the conscious decision to accept or reject music based on the message. To eliminate any potential for ungodliness I listen to instrumental music.
- +Read for knowledge. I see no point in reading fiction or mindless works. There needs to be a payoff in terms of growth of intellect or wisdom. As I learn, I am a better witness for Christ.
- +Practice thoughtfulness toward mom and wife. Call or give flowers "just because." It feels good not to be a turd who habitually excuses themselves from showing affection and appreciation. Saving money is not worth coming off as tight and selfish, or worse, knowing that is how you are perceived and taking delight in it.

- +Say "THANK YOU," often. I try to say thanks to God as often as I would like to hear it from others.
