HOW WILL YOU ESCAPE BEING CONDEMNED TO HELL?

Yet, Jesus said, "Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him up at the last day (John 6:54)." Jesus pushed two buttons with one statement. He talks about the necessity of feasting on Him, then claims authority to raise people from the dead! With regularity, Jesus said things that upset, irritated, and infuriated people. Not just once or twice, but repeatedly. He had no interest in trying to be nice or inclusive. He forced people to make a choice about Him, and if someone rejected Him, so be it. He did not beg people to reconsider, even though he knew that it might mean eternal condemnation for them!

Many Christians have no clue how stern Jesus was in His effort to have people wake up to their sinfulness and repent of it. He knew it was a matter of salvation or damnation.
